

in their proper places, and the wineglasses had been washed. Gone were the piles of letters, bills, magazines and catalogues. Gone was the envelope that had the tickets for the Sharks game. So, I meekly asked my compassionate wife, where she put the tickets.

Her reply was, "I didn't see them. Where did you put them?"

My soft-spoken reply was, "I put them on the table with all the mail and stuff that was piling up. But I left it out in plain sight knowing that we had to use it soon."

"Well, if you left it on the table, I put everything in a shopping bag and put it in our room, but I'm sure it wasn't on the table. I didn't see it. I didn't touch it."

I went upstairs to look for the tickets. There were 3 shopping bags of assorted "stuff". I went through each one, but couldn't find the tickets. Time was running out and I began to panic.

"It's not here!!!" I yelled downstairs. My thoughtful but helpful wife began to also look. "Maybe you left them in your office."

Desperate, I went to my office. Luckily it is only 30 seconds away. Just a week ago, my desk had been filled with 3 piles of papers that needed my attention. But Tuesday, I spent all day clearing my desk off, so I knew the tickets weren't on my desk. I looked anyway. No luck, no tickets.

By now, it was 7:00 PM. I had to break the news to my sons, "Sorry, I couldn't find the tickets." One of my sons who had put on a San Jose

Sharks hat said, "That's okay." Instead, we spent the cleaning the house, watching a movie and playing a family game of "Apples to Apples" and "Scattergories."

For the next several days, I kept wondering what happened to those tickets. I looked in the trash, the recycle bin and re-looked in those shopping bags and my office.

Then, **I began the process of placing blame.** I knew I put them on the table. My wife must have accidentally put them somewhere. I even checked under the tablecloth thinking that she may have just covered it by mistake.

Perhaps Niko, our dog, had gotten up on the dining room table and eaten the tickets when we had left him alone in the house. The tickets must have grown legs and walked out because they were nowhere to be seen.

A week later, I had a Center for Buddhist Education meeting at our Jodo Shinshu Center in Berkeley. I gathered all my notes, files, and paper and put them in my briefcase.

As the meeting started, I reached into my briefcase for a pen and felt an envelope. I opened the envelope and found the tickets. I must have put them in my briefcase, but I can't recall ever doing it. I can't even think of why I would have put them in there in the first place. Yet I was the only person that had access to this briefcase.

I had been so sure that I brought home the envelope with the tickets and placed them

on the dining room table. I would have staked my life on it. **But the reality is that the tickets were in my briefcase.**

Sometimes we are so certain of our actions or what we see that we convince ourselves that we are right and then we blame others. Yet often, the reality is that we are mistaken or have forgotten what we did simply because we weren't paying attention.

The Buddha's Aspiration is to have all sentient beings awaken: Awaken to the truths that life is in constant change and that all life is dependent upon each other. Awaken to the reality of our human limitations and be able to admit our faults and weaknesses. But most of all Awaken to the reality that just as we are, we constantly receive the benefits of the wisdom and compassion of others. When we awaken to this, we can't help but feel a deep sense of gratitude and appreciation.

So before I forget, I thank all of you, who have helped make the year 2010 so special to my family and me. Despite my many faults and limitations, you continue to treat me with respect and support. I am deeply grateful. And may the New Year of 2011, the 50th anniversary year as an independent temple of the Mountain View Buddhist Temple, be one filled with much joy, fun and Nembutsu.



Rennyo Shonin & His Model for Propagation in the Modern World

Rennyo Shonin is sometimes described as the “Second Founder” because of his great success in developing the Hongwanji organization.

What was it that made his endeavors successful?

John Arima's Response

There are four major factors that made Rennyo Shonin's endeavors in development of the Hongwanji organization successful. The first factor is the media through which Rennyo provided direct communication to the monto, followers of Jodo Shinshu who often formed small dojo as congregational locations. In conjunction with this distribution media, Rennyo dealt honestly and directly with misinterpretation of the dharma.

The second factor is Rennyo's sensitivity to the social influence of the Jodo Shinshu teachings on its followers and their actions in response those teachings.

The third factor is Omi Prefecture's position as a commercial and communication center of Japan during this period.

The fourth factor is the organizational structure that Rennyo strengthened throughout the Hongwanji system of temples.

Is there anything that we can learn from him to support our contemporary propagation of Jodo Shinshu?

John Arima's Response

With regard to contemporary propagation of Jodo Shinshu, the key is to follow the model set by Rennyo and to apply contemporary equivalents.

For the first major factor of Rennyo's success, the proper choice of a communication medium, the Internet is a logical contemporary extension Rennyo's use of ofumi.

For the second factor, a sensitivity to the social influence of Jodo Shinshu teachings, realization that the prevalent perceptions of Buddhism today, especially in North America, are of other forms of Buddhist practice. Jodo Shinshu education in North America should be built upon a student with preconceived notions of what Buddhism is.

For the third factor, finding a location that is a commercial and communications center, the focus again comes back to the Internet.

Finally, for the fourth factor, the organizational structure, more centralized control is required. For example, the Buddhist Churches of America is organized with minimal permanent staff at its headquarters. A National Board that turns over its leadership on a regular basis handles the majority of the management.

By design, this management structure cannot consistently support long-term programs. Without an increased amount of centralized control and the appropriate level of staffing to support it, BCA headquarters cannot manage long-term programs to propagate Jodo Shinshu teachings across the continental United States. A management study applying the model set by Rennyo in a contemporary context is required to determine the specific details, but with the foundation of the equivalents cited, many positive changes could be implemented to better propagate Jodo Shinshu.

The following is a short overview of John Arima's response to questions posed

in the JSCC History of Jodo Shinshu Correspondence Course.

Don't Miss Hachiko Monogatari—Thurs, Jan 20, 2011

This heart-warming 1987 Japanese film is based on the true story of Hachiko, an Akita dog, which belonged to Hidesaburo Ueno, a professor at the University of Tokyo.

This remarkable, loyal, faithful Akita dog, saw his master off at the front door of their home and

greeted him daily at the end of the day at the nearby Shibuya train station as his master returned from work. This routine went on from 1924 to 1925. This daily routine came to an sudden end when the professor died of a stroke while at work. Even after Hachiko was given to another

family he continued his daily wait at the train station for the next 10 years. Hachiko became a national hero and symbol of loyalty so that in 1934 a bronze statue of him was erected at the exact location at the Shibuya station. This movie has English subtitles.

Our primary goal for the MVBT 50th Anniversary Project is **\$3.65 million**. For the current membership of 526, this would require a yearly pledge of \$1,400 for five years, or a five-year monthly pledge of \$117 per individual member. A total donation \$7,000 per member is needed to fund this first phase of our Master Plan.

Our ultimate goal is to build what we can afford, and we will scale the projects to reflect the funds we receive. We will not expose the Temple to financial loss.


