Nagarjuna lived during the 1st century and is credited as one of the masters in the Dharma lineage of many Buddhist Sects, including Jodo Shinshu Buddhism. Shinran felt that one of Nagarjuna's important contributions was to define the **Easy Practice** as Nembutsu or calling the Name of Amida Buddha (Namo Amida Butsu).

This was to distinguish it from the **Difficult Practices** of meditation, keeping precepts, or living as

a monk. Nagarjuna likened performing the Difficult Practices to traveling overland. I think of this expression every time I started to get drowsy on the long hot drive through the desert, and especially during the last couple of weeks.

Like many of you, I have just completed a couple of trips over the summer. After our Obon Festival we took a vacation to Florida. From there, Linda and Tommy went directly to Boston while Curtis, Justin and I returned home to Mountain View.



I spent a few days conducting services, and then left the following Monday for Los Angeles for the BCA Ministers' summer research seminar. Meanwhile, Linda

and Tommy returned from Boston on Tuesday night. The very next morning, Linda drove down to LA with Curtis to meet me. When the seminar ended on Thursday, we drove to Arizona to get Curtis settled in for school. On Friday morning, I flew back to San Jose for a funeral. Then on Saturday morning, I flew back to Arizona to drive the van back with Linda.

The drive home from Phoenix felt even longer. We planned to leave around 11AM. But en route to Phoenix, the van started making a clunking, grinding sound every time we turned left. On the morning of our drive back, we took the van to a garage to make sure the van could make it back home. After we had lunch with Curtis and said our goodbyes, we finally started our drive home. However, we had just driven about 15 miles on the freeway when I realized that I had forgotten my cell phone at Curtis' place. **We had to go back.**

Upon retrieving my cell phone, we set out a second time. By this time, we had already driven 100 miles on this tank of gas. I was worried that we wouldn't make it to Palm Springs, where we planned our next re-fueling. So we stopped at a nearby gas station to top off the tank.

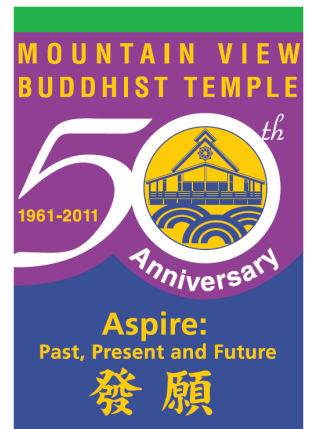

Sit Back, Relax and Recite Nembutsu (Cont'd from Page 1)

But after we filled up, Linda couldn't find her sunglasses anywhere in the van. We used my cell phone (that I had just picked up) to call Curtis to see if she had left her sunglasses with him. She sure did. We had to go back to Curtis, say our farewells again and by the time we got on the road, it was 2 PM already.

Flying 3,000 miles to Florida took about 7.5 hours. In contrast, it took us 2 day of driving 6.5 hours/day just to drive 725 miles to Phoenix. Definitely the Difficult Practice. Or was it?

Nagarjuna compared performing the Easy Practice of Nembutsu was like traveling upon water by boat. Obviously, Nagarjuna lived long before air travel, but the modern analogy can be interpreted to include air travel. Like riding in a boat, or flying in a plane, Nagarjuna noted that the practice of Nembutsu was easy because it required no special education or training. Young or old, rich or poor, educated or uneducated all could perform the simple practice of reciting Namo Amida Butsu.

In this way, flying in a plane or riding in a boat is **conceptually** very simple. We don't have to know how to fly a plane. If an engine needs fixing, the airline mechanics do the work. If we get tired we can just fall asleep. When

we get thirsty we can ask for something to drink. Most of all, if we have to go to the bathroom, we don't have to worry if the next exit will have a bathroom to run into. All we have to do is board the ship or plane and as the flight attendants say, “Sit back, relax and enjoy the flight.”



However, **physically** boarding a plane is not necessarily easy or simple. We must arrive 1-2 hours prior to departure. We need identification and boarding passes. Getting through security checkpoints can take almost an hour. We must remove shoes, wallets, belts and watches before going through scanners. Once onboard, everyone jockeys for overhead bin space for carry-on luggage, and if you sit on the aisle seats you risk your life as people try to cram their heavy bags over you into the overhead bin.

Similarly, even though the Nembutsu may be considered to be an “Easy” practice, getting to the point of sincere recitation can be very difficult. Like flying, the **conceptual act** of reciting, “Namo Amida Butsu” is simple and easy, but the **physical act** of reciting “Namo Amida Butsu” is difficult.

How many times have I been asked to lead “Namo Amida

Butsu” before we have a meal? Why must a minister lead it? Anyone can do it. It should come out freely and naturally.

What prevents it from being a totally spontaneous act is our ego. We calculate whether or not the time is appropriate for us to recite it. We don't want to embarrass ourselves if we say it first. We would rather hide with the masses and follow a leader. This kind of thinking is what makes reciting the Nembutsu so difficult.

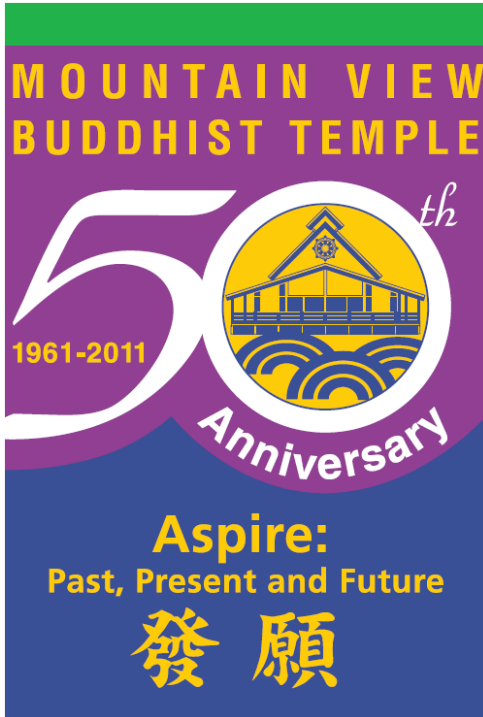
So how do we get to the point when reciting the Nembutsu becomes free and easy? For Shinran Shonin, it occurs when we are able to reflect honestly upon our ego-centered selves and realize all the wonderful gifts that we have already received in spite of our conditions.

Sounds simple enough but again, it is very difficult to attain.

All the more important to have a place to practice.

Fortunately we have had a just such a place these past 50 years. Please join the celebration of the Mountain View Buddhist Temple's 50th anniversary this September 29 and 30th. I am looking forward to seeing you there.

And I will be happy to lead in the recitation of Nembutsu so that you can just sit back, relax, and recite Namo Amida Butsu with joy and appreciation.

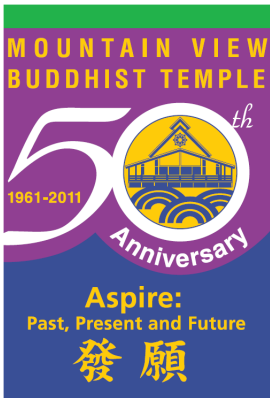
