### Awaken to the Preciousness of Life

A couple of days ago while watching the news, I was really surprised to learn that there are over 40,000 people in the U.S. who commit suicide every year. I was also surprised to hear that among the many causes of death like cancer, brain disease, car accident, and so on, suicide is the tenth leading cause of death in the U.S. To make sense of that number—40,000—it means over 110 people die every day by their own hand. Now you can see what a large number of people committed suicide in this country. How sad it is.

People end their lives for any number of reasons, but mainly because they are in despair over their job, their family or society.

Of course, this societal problem is not restricted to the U.S. In Japan, for instance, over 20,000 people commit suicide every year.

The most regrettable among these deaths are the many children who commit suicide because they have been bullied.

Why do so many children so full of promise resort to killing themselves? My heart nearly breaks when I think about young children who couldn't share their problems and worry, who suffered alone in distress and loneli-

ness, then made the decision to end their own lives. As Buddhists, how should we face this serious social problem?

First, I believe that it is most important that both those who are the victims of bullying and those who are their tormentors comprehend the preciousness of the life that they have received. The gift of life that we receive from our parents has the magnificent history of the universe wrapped in our parents' own boundless wishes for each one of us. This life is a great favor that, no matter how hard we try, we cannot repay. We must realize how rare it is that we are able to be born into this world as human and that we are alive at this moment.

The historical Buddha, Sakyamuni,

addresses the difficulty of receiving human life in this world in a sutra called *Zo-Agon* or *Samyukta Āgama*. In this sutra, there is a famous fable called, "A Blind Turtle and a Floating Board."

One day, Sakyamuni Buddha posed the following question to his disciple, Anan: "Now suppose there is a blind turtle at the bottom of the boundless ocean. This turtle will be able to show its face at the sea's surface only once in a hundred years. A board is floating on the ocean's surface and there is a small hole in the middle of it that turtle can fit its face into. When this turtle—which surfaces only once every hundred years—comes to the surface, can he put his face into the hole in that board even one time?"

Anan answered, "It's impossible! Even if the turtle had hun-

dreds of millions of years or even millions of millions of years to put its face in that hole, it would be very hard to do."

Then Buddha said, "I know everyone thinks that it's impossible! But are you sure? To be born into this world as a human is infinitely more difficult than a blind turtle putting its face into the hole in a board!"

Please contemplate this. One blind turtle drifts about at the mercy of the waves in the vast expanse of the sea for a hundred years, or even one thousand years, in order to look for the floating board. When he finally encounters it, he thinks he will be able to put his face in the hole. But quite unexpectedly a breeze comes up, disturbing the water's surface and

**Status of Vacant Land Development**

## Facilities Planning Committee News



In 2015, the Facilities Planning Committee (FPC) endeavored to move forward with finding the optimal utilization of the Temple's open land. With the authorization of the Board of Directors, the FPC engaged Colliers International to assist in the process of locating a qualified development partner with the goal of entering in a long-term

ground lease (never a sale) for the vacant land. It was important to the Board and the FPC that any agreement we consider optimizes income and minimizes land devoted to the development.

A Request for Proposal (RFP) process was created with the guidance of the FPC through Colliers and approximately ten developers responded. The FPC then worked through the details of each proposal to narrow the field to a few final qualified and quality candidates. As part of the process of negotiating the ultimate ground lease, the Board approved the FPC request to engage a real estate attorney with the highly

respected firm of Wilson Sonsini Goodrich & Rosati to assist us with the related legal work.

The FPC is working toward finalization of the selection of the developer partner and execution of the ground lease in 2016.

makes the board move and the turtle fails.

Another hundred years pass and again the turtle rises to the surface and happens upon the drifting board. This time, ripples make the board move away and again the turtle fails. So it is extremely difficult for a blind turtle, dependent on wind and wave, to find the drifting board and to put its face in that opening even if a chance of once a hundred years comes.

Through this astounding fable, Sakyamuni Buddha teaches us the wonder of receiving life in human form in this world, a nearly impossible probability. The words at the beginning of the Three Treasures, "Rare is it to receive life in human

form; yet, now I have received it," sink deep into my mind again.

Each one of us has a unique opportunity that is ours alone. We can only live once, so Sakyamuni Buddha points us in the direction of a way of living that makes each life shine; that is, understanding one another and respecting and supporting one another, which is the way those of us fortunate enough to have received human life should live.

Consider again these familiar words: "Rare is it to receive life in human form; yet, now I have received it." I believe if we truly rejoice in and appreciate our own life, we will come to understand how precious and valuable each life is and how we must treasure all lives as if they were our own. Bullying, which can threaten and

wear a child down till he or she will even consider suicide to escape it, is a truly shameful act, and an unforgivable act as a Buddhist because it is counter to the vow of Amida Buddha. We must always keep this in mind and neither commit nor should we tolerate any act of cruelty upon another person, especially a child.

During our lifetime, each of us will have to endure hardship and stress. However, no matter how painful a position we are in, I sincerely hope each of us can strive to be a true Nembutsu follower, grateful and joyful to have received life in human form as we embrace the light of the Nembutsu.

# マウンテンビュー「仏教会」「回向」 二〇一六年三月法話

## いのち めざ — 生命に目覚める —

駐在開教使 向嶋謙史

先日あるニュースを見て驚いたのですが、アメリカでは毎年四万人を超える人達が自分の生命を絶つています。そして更に、癌や脳疾患、交通事故等といった数多くある死亡原因の中で、自殺がアメリカ国内で十番目に多いのです。年間四万人が亡くなるということは、これを日に換算しますと、一日に百十人ほどの方が自分の生命を絶つていくということです。如何に自殺で亡くなる方がアメリカで多いかが分かります。大変悲しむべきことです。

残念ながら、仕事や家庭、そして社会に絶望して亡くなる人が後を絶ちません。これは決してアメリカだけの問題ではなく、日本に於いても大きな社会問題となつていきます。なぜなら日本でも、毎年、二万人以上の方が自ら生命を絶つていくからです。

その中でも一番受け入れ難いことは、いじめが原因で亡くなる子供達が非常に多いということです。未来ある子供達が何故若くして自ら生命を絶たなければならなかったのか。また幼い子供達が誰にも相談できずに、孤独の中で一人悩み苦しむ、涙の果てに死を選んだことを考えると、胸が張り裂ける思いでいっぱいです。私達は仏教徒として、この深刻な社会問題にどう立ち向かうべきでしょうか。

まず、いじめる側もいじめられる側も、自分の授かった

生命の尊さに気付くことが何よりも大切だと思えます。両親から頂いたこの生命には壮大な宇宙の歴史があり、計り知れない親の願いがあり、そして報じきれない多大な恩恵があるのです。私達が人としてこの世に生まれ、今という時間を生かされていく尊さに気付かなければなりません。

この世に生を受けることの難しさを、お釈迦さまは「維阿含経」に「盲亀浮木の譬え」で教えて下さっております。

ある時、お釈迦さまはお弟子さんである阿難尊者に、次のように尋ねられました。

「果てしなく広がる海の底に、目の見えない一匹の亀がいたとする。その亀は百年に一度だけ、海面に顔を出すのだ。また、大海には一枚の板が浮いていて、その真中にはちよつと亀の頭が入る小さな穴が開いている。百年に一度、浮かび上がるこの亀が、海面に顔を出した時に、板の穴に頭を入れることが一度でもできるだろうか？」と。

弟子の阿難は、「そんなことは考えられません。もしかして、何億年、何兆年かけて頭を入れることができないことがあつたとしても、大変難しいことです」と答えられました。

するとお釈迦さまは、「誰もがそんなことはありえないと考えるだろう。しかし、果たしてどうだろうか？ 私達が人間に生まれるという事は、この亀が板の穴に頭を入れること以上に難しいことなのだ」と教えて下さっています。

皆さん想像してみてください。目の見えない一匹の亀が一本の浮木を探し求めて、百年も千年も大海原を漂っています。百年目に浮木と出会って穴に頭が入るのかと思いきや、一瞬の風で浮木が動き、不

成功に終わってしまう。離れ離れになつてからまた百年。今度は波に邪魔をされて失敗に終わる。このように、百年に一度のチャンスが来ても目の見えない亀にとつて、波や風にまかせて浮かぶ板との巡り合わせ、更に浮木の穴に頭を入れるということは至難の業です。何とも気が遠くなるお話です。

しかし、お釈迦さまが教えて下さっているように、私達が人としてこの世に生を受けたことはそれ以上に有り難いことなのです。三幅依文にある「人身受け難し、今已に受く」のお言葉が今改めて、心にしみじみと伝わってまいります。

私達一人ひとりが何者にも犯すことのできない尊い生命を授かつているのです。一度しかない人生で、互いの生命を輝かせ合い、互いに敬つていく生き方が、人として生を受けた者の歩むべき道だとお釈迦さまは、私達に生命の方向を示して下さいました。今一度、個々の生命の存在について深く考えて頂きたいと思えます。受け難い人としての生命を頂いて、今生がされて生きている。自分の生命の存在に心から喜び、感謝することができたなら、自分の生命同様他の生命がどれほど尊く、どれほど大切にしなければならぬかという事に目覚めて頂けると信じています。そして、その尊い生命を脅かすようないじめが人として如何に醜い行為、仏教徒として許されざる行為、そして、私達の真の親、阿闍陀仏の願いに背いた恥すべき行為であるかを私達一人ひとりが肝に銘じていかななくてはなりません。

私達は生きていく上で、数多くの悩みや苦しみに遭い遇します。しかし、どれほど苦しい立場にいたとしても、常にお念仏の光を仰ぎながら、生かされている今を、感謝し喜べる一念仏尊とありたいと願っています。





The Mountain View Buddhist Temple is delighted to host "Approaching the Sacred: Japanese Buddhist Temples in Hawaii," a photographic display focusing on various Japanese Buddhist temples. This display was made possible with the generous support of a grant from The Hiroaki, Elaine & Lawrence Kono Foundation, and with the cooperation of the Hawai'i Buddhist Council, Bukkyo Dendo Kyokai and the Japanese Cultural Center of Hawai'i.

Drs. George and Willa Tanabe, professors emeriti of religion and art, respectively, at the University of Hawaii, visited every temple in Hawaii (90 in all) over a three year period. *Japanese Buddhist Temples in Hawaii: An Illustrated Guide* (UH Press, 2012) resulted from their research, which provides an overview of Buddhism in Hawaii as well as a temple by temple description. In conjunction with the guide, they curated a traveling photographic display "Approaching the Sacred," which highlights architectural features, altar arrangements, temple art and furnishings, and reveals the symbolic meanings embedded in these objects.

This traveling exhibit will be on display at MVBT for one day only, Sunday, March 13. The Tanabes will be on hand at the temple for a presentation.
